The St. Olaf College Dance Department

The St. Olaf College Dance Department offers a nurturing environment in which to pursue a BA in Dance with training, performing, and choreography opportunities in Modern/Contemporary, West African, Hip Hop, Ballet, International dance, Ballroom, Jazz, and Tap. The department consists of four core faculty plus four adjunct faculty, a full-time technical director, and a staff musician. The Dance Department graduates an average of 8-10 dance majors a year and serves over 500 students yearly.

The St. Olaf College Dance Department engages students in the study of dance as a vital form of human expression, understanding, communication, and interaction. Partnering with the College's liberal arts curriculum and making connections with other academic fields, the dance program encourages the exploration of complex ideas through investigation, knowledge, and expression of the body.

Our program combines embodied practice with critical thinking to root dance forms from around the world in their culturally, socially, and politically informed values. This is a fundamental means of self-discovery, understanding other dancing bodies, and advancing an anti-racist, equitable, and just community. Whether students in our program become dance artists, choreographers, scholars, teachers or integrate their skills and knowledge into other fields, they grow into movers, makers, and thinkers who responsibly respond to, serve, and shape the world around them.

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Faculty Biographies

Currently, **Heather Klopchin** is a Professor of Dance and Chair of the Dance Department, and the Oscar and Gertrude Boe Overby Distinguished Professor at St. Olaf College where she teaches Modern Dance, Senior Seminar, and First Year Seminar. She also choreographs for Companydance[®]. Heather holds a BS degree in Management from the State University of New York (SUNY) at Geneseo and an MFA degree in Dance choreography and performance from the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.

Heather is passionate about performing, choreographing, researching, and teaching dance. Highlights of her career to date include performing in works by Danny Buraczeski, Joe Chvala, Robert Cohan, Suzanne Costello, David Dorfman, Bill Evans, Karla Grotting, Judith Howard, Doris Humphrey, Mathew Janczewski, Walter Kennedy, Jennifer Isle, Linda Lehovec, Paula Mann, Gabriel Masson, Mark Morris, Jeffrey Peterson, Stuart Pimsler, Anthony Roberts, Melissa Rolnick, Zoe Sealy, Karis Sloss, Daniel Stark, Robin Stiehm, Deborah Thayer, Doug Varone, and Renée Wadleigh. She has performed with *Stuart Pimsler* Dance and Theater, ARENA Dances, Zenon Dance Company, Eclectic Edge Ensemble, Linda Lehovec & Dancers, Joe Chvala Flying Foot Forum, Dancing People Company, Off Leash Area, and Alternative Motion Project. Heather also currently serves as the ACDA (American College Dance Association) North-Central Regional Director.

Scott Stafford is a Minneapolis based choreographer, dancer, and teaching artist. He believes expression is vital, and accessible to every individual. His artistic efforts have been recognized by The Foundation for Contemporary Arts, The Minnesota State Arts Board, Minnesota Regional Arts Council, and Springboard For the Arts. He is the recipient of a 2023 Jerome Hill Artist Fellowship.

He has toured as a performer and teacher around the United States, with residencies spanning university dance departments, k-12, contemporary art museums, arts organizations, and partnerships with regional state parks. In addition to creating performance work, Scott competes in the ballroom scene in the categories of hand performance, runway, and New Way Vogue as Edward.007. Stafford was born in Windsor, Ontario and grew up in Metro Detroit. He is a devoted student of qigong, and can be found either deep in the forest or step-touching on a dim dance floor.

As a 15-year-old mediocre soccer player, **Brianna Rae Johnson** walked into her high school's modern dance department and never looked back. She went on to receive Dance and Biology degrees and an American Racial and Multicultural Studies concentration from St. Olaf College and a Master of Fine Arts in Dance from The Ohio State University. As a mover, she has focused on postmodern release technique and floorwork, contact improvisation, Latinx social dance, and West African Dance.

As a maker, Brianna creates immersive, intermedial, and interactive works for the stage, gallery, and screen. Her choreography has been performed throughout the Midwest and her films have been selected for festivals around the world. Brianna has performed and toured with Robin Stiehm's *Dancing People Company* and Minnesota-based choreographers such as Erin Drummond, Paula Mann, and Mathew Janczewski. With great gratitude, Brianna is back at St. Olaf College as a Visiting Assistant Professor.

Cynthia Gutierrez-Garner is a Latinx choreographer and dance educator committed to inclusion, representation and social consciousness in both pedagogy and creative practice. She is a teaching specialist and creative researcher in both contemporary post-modern dance and American concert jazz technique. Gutierrez-Garner received her B.F.A. Summa Cum Laude at the University of Minnesota, and her M.F.A. as an Advanced Opportunity Fellow at the University of Wisconsin Milwaukee. She has served as the Choreographer in Residence for the Minnesota Dance Theater, and is a four-time winner of the Arizona Choreography Competition's Professional Division. Works by Gutierrez-Garner have been commissioned by numerous institutions across the U.S. including Kent State University, University of Minnesota, Arizona State University, Gustavus Adolphus College, University of Oregon, University of Wisconsin, Middle Tennessee State University, University of Texas Rio Grande and the American University.

Professional company commissions include the Dulce Dance Company, Eclectic Edge Ensemble, Zenon Dance Company, Concerto Dance Company and L.A. based JazzAntiqua. Cynthia's work has been produced across the U.S in Minneapolis, MN (including the Southern Theater, the Fitzgerald Theater, the Walker Art Center, the O'Shaugnessey Theater, the Guthrie Lab), in Arizona (including the Herberger Theater, Tempe Center for the Arts and the Scottsdale Center for the Arts), New York City's Miller Theater, and the Kennedy Center in Washington D.C., Gutierrez-Garner's work has seen support from organizations such as the Jerome Foundation, the McKnight Foundation, the Walker Art Center, the Arizona Commission on the Arts, and the Lane Arts Council. She has taught on the dance faculties of the University of Minnesota, Twin Cities and Gustavus Adolphus College, the prestigious Bates Dance Festival in Lewiston, Maine and as a guest faculty at Xuchang University in China. She currently serves on the faculty of Western Oregon University and is the artistic director of Company Movimiento.



Jeffrey Peterson has been making choreography for over 25 years, including work in and across dance, the marching arts, and musical theater. Hailed as "...moving and heart-racingly joyous..." by the St. Paul Pioneer Press and "...poetic precision..." by the Minneapolis Star Tribune, his dances have been commissioned by Dance New Amsterdam, Judson Memorial Church, and Rhythmically Speaking, and have appeared in The DanceNOW/NYC Festival at Joyce Soho and Joe's Pub, The Minnesota Fringe Festival, as well as at Dixon Place and Intermedia Arts, among others. He has made choreography at Gustavus Adolphus, Muhlenberg, and Hobart & William Smith Colleges; Bucknell, Old Dominion, and Hamline Universities; and for the Perpich Center for Arts Education. Jeffrey's creations embrace aesthetic, intellectual, and emotional content in order to comment on the human condition. His approaches seek to encourage performers and audience to embrace dancing that enlivens and intermingles the mind, body, and spirit.

Jeffrey's performing career includes The Madison Scouts Drum and Bugle Corps, Every-Body Winterguard, JAZZDANCE by Danny Buraczeski, ARENA Dances by Mathew Janczewski, The Grand Step Project by Stephan Koplowitz, Clare Byrne Dance, DELiRiOUS Dance Co. / Edisa Weeks, and The Minnesota Opera.

He holds an MFA in Dance Performance and Choreography from NYU's Tisch School of the Arts, a Certification in Laban/Bartenieff Movement Analysis from Integrated Movement Studies, and a BFA in Dance from the University of Minnesota - Twin Cities. Jeffrey serves as an Adjunct Associate Professor here at St. Olaf.

Student Biographies

Paulina Morera Quesada is a senior majoring in Inclusivity in the Performing Arts, a self-designed major that focuses on the intersections between Dance and Theater to create spaces for immigrants, POC, and LGBTQ+ folks in the performing arts, with concentrations in Race and Ethnic Studies and Gender and Sexuality Studies. Originating from Quesada in Costa Rica, they are interested in creating thought-provoking, socially conscious and liberating works that challenge the restrictive norms established by systems of oppression. Throughout their time at St. Olaf, she has collaborated with artists from different cultural backgrounds in groups such as KaLeDance Studio, POC Ole Theater, the Wandering Ensemble, and the GreenRoom Fellowship. As a mover, she is interested in the fusion of jazz, modern, bachata, salsa, and Costa Rican traditional dance.

Ariel (Rel) is in her sophomore year, a declared dance major on the pre-health track. Artistry has been embedded in her since she was born (thank you mom and dad), and the steadfast desire to become a doctor came shortly after (6 years later in kindergarten). She's sort of always known what she's meant to do, but not who she is made to be. At thirteen years old, she gave her life to Jesus, marking the beginning of lifelong discovery and exploration. Now at St. Olaf, she is delighted to share her passion for art and people with this community.

Technical Designer

Stephen Schroeder, Lighting Designer and Technical Director, joined the St. Olaf community in 2019 as the Technical Director of the Dance Department and has enjoyed lighting dance and playing backstage since 1996 when he came upon the technical aspects of the theater while pursuing his BFA in Dance from the University of Colorado-Boulder.
