Annotated Bibliography for Final Project

This is graded individually and is worth 5% of your total grade

<u>Context:</u> One of the Intended Learning Outcomes for FYS is to Identify, evaluate, and utilize a variety of academic sources. This Annotated Bibliography (which is part of your larger assignment to create a fictional DTC-GT company) will be assessed for meeting this goal.

<u>Format:</u> Your bibliography can be in any format (bullet points, written paragraph or spreadsheet) that is shareable with me and that supports including the requirements listed below for <u>three different sources</u>. You may want to choose your format after you annotate at least one source so that you know what will best support your project.

<u>Sources:</u> As we have done for other assignments in this class, you may use a variety of types of sources. At least one source must be a scholarly source, that is, it should be from a peer-reviewed journal. The other two sources you use, may be anything - interviews, opinion pieces, newspaper articles, podcasts, etc. The important thing for this assignment is that you are able to evaluate each of the three sources for a variety of criteria.

Each of your three entries is required to have:

- 1. Full citation in APA citation style
- 2. An <u>evaluation</u> of each source for the following criteria:
 - a. Is the source scholarly (peer reviewed) or informal?
 - b. <u>Currency</u>: is the source recent enough to be of value? Has this research been updated more recently?
 - c. Authority: who wrote the source? What expertise do they draw on?
 - d. <u>Motivation</u>: what motivation do the authors and the publisher have for providing this information? Who funded this research or publication?
 - e. <u>Reliability:</u> Do other organizations or researchers use this information (is it cited by others)? Does this information match what other organizations and researchers publish or say?
- 3. Your notes from a careful reading (or listening or viewing viewing) of the source. There is a huge difference between writing "this source talks about..." and "this source says [these specific things] about." You want to write "this source says [these specific things] about." NOTE: long sources do not need to be thoroughly annotated just annotate what you might use in your research process.
- 4. After carefully reading and thinking about what you learned from each source, identify concrete information that could relate to your topic, and specify possible ways you might use that information **in your final project.**

Assessment

This specific assignment requires you to have at least three source entries completed in your annotated bibliography. Assessment will be as follows:

- There are three or more thorough and clear annotations (2 pt)
- Each entry contains the source's complete reference in APA format (3 pts)
- Each entry contains a statement of whether the source is scholarly (peer-reviewed) or informal (1 pt)
- Each entry contains a statement of currency (1 pt)
- Each entry contains a statement of authority (1 pt)
- Each entry contains a statement of motivation (1 pt)
- Each entry contains a statement of reliability (1 pt)
- Each entry contains concrete and specific information about the actual content of the source (6 pts)
- most of the notes in each entry are paraphrased direct quotes are rarely included (1 pt)
- Each entry contains your ideas about how you might want to use that source in your project (3 pts)
