MEDIEVAL STUDIES PROGRAM 2023-2024

Founded in 1971, Medieval Studies is one of the oldest interdisciplinary programs at St. Olaf College. Most courses focus on Europe and the British Isles, a few on medieval China or Japan. Students are encouraged to examine the Middle Ages from a variety of perspectives, including comparative and cross-cultural ones.

It is common for students to combine a Medieval Studies major with another major such as English, philosophy, religion, women's and gender studies, history, art history, or a modern language. Even students majoring in math, natural science, or fine arts may opt to use Medieval Studies as half of a double major.

Every Medieval Studies major must complete Latin 235 (Medieval Latin). If that course is unavailable, any other Latin course above 231 may be used as a substitute.

Also required are a medieval literature course, a medieval history course, four electives selected from Art History, Asian Studies, Enduring Questions, English, History, Music, Norwegian, Philosophy, Religion, and Theater, and an Independent Research on a topic of the student's choice (e.g., Justinian's law code, medieval ritual processions, Gregorian chant, Beguine mystics, Malory's Arthur, feud and reconciliation in Old Norse myth, Hunyadi Hungary). Independent studies in medieval languages may be used as electives. A paper written for a Level III course may replace the IR. Study abroad and courses at Carleton College extend the range of possibilities.
