

## Bloodborne Pathogens

### What are Bloodborne Pathogens?

- **Infectious microorganisms** found in:
  - Human blood
  - Many body fluids
  - Tissues that are not preserved
- **Can cause diseases in humans.**
- **The most common/serious examples:**
  - Hepatitis B Virus (HBV)
  - Hepatitis C Virus (HCV)
  - Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV)
- **Transmitted** by other vectors (malaria).

### How Might You be Exposed to Bloodborne Pathogens?

- **Needlestick or sharps injury** via a contaminated object.
- **Contact with infectious materials to the membranes** of the nose, eyes, or mouth; or broken skin.

### A Bloodborne Pathogen on Your Skin is not Necessarily an Injury:

- **Intact skin** = fantastic barrier to blood
- Contact with another person's blood or fluids without your skin being cut or punctured does not, in itself, constitute an injury or illness.

### Best Practices to Prevent Exposure to Bloodborne Pathogens:

- **Use Universal Precautions:**
  - Treat all blood or other human body fluids as infectious.
  - Wear gloves when handling items, cleaning equipment, cleaning up spills, placing items into biohazard containers, or transporting containers.
  - Wear additional PPE (e.g., goggles) if splattering is possible.
  - Dispose of regulated waste in the red and labeled biohazard bags or sharps containers.
  - **Wash Your Hands** immediately after completing the task.
- **Follow the Work Practice Controls** as outlined in Section 7.6 of the STO Exposure Control Plan.
  - Section 7.6 includes instructions for proper glove use, and donning & doffing PPE.
- **Spill Cleanup Procedures** are in 7.8.
- **Proper Handling of Waste Containers:**
  - Never carry bags against your body.
  - Never compress the bag with your hands/body.
  - Double-bag if the 1<sup>st</sup> bag appears compromised.
  - Never reach inside of a sharps container.

### If You Think That You Have Been Exposed:

- Wash the wound, or rinse/flush your mouth, eyes, nose.
- Contact your supervisor **immediately** so that proper medical attention can begin.

### The Most Important Rule:

**If It's Wet and It's Not Yours  
then  
Don't Get It On You!**
