## 1. One Introductory Course (usually during First year):

Principles of Psychology (Psych 125) - this course (or AP Psychology credit score of 4 or 5) is a prerequisite for other Psychology courses.
2. Two Methodology Courses (ideally by end of Sophomore year):

Statistics (Stats 172, or Stats 110 or 212, or Econ 260/263, or AP Statistics credit score of 4 or 5).
Research Methods (Psych 230; prerequisite is Statistics).

## 3. Three Psychology Core Content Courses: Choose at least 1 each from 3 of the 4 core areas below:

*Note: some core courses are prerequisite for specific 300 -level courses, so it is a good idea to complete some core courses before Senior year.

- Psych 394 (Internship) counts toward the major but does not count toward this 300-level course requirement.
