# Bridge Day I, II, & III

This year, Upward Bound (UB) hosted three mandatory College Application Days for our senior "Bridge" students, who are preparing to transition from high school to college. Bridge Day I took place on September 23, 2025, and Bridge Days II and III were held during MEA break on October 16 and 17 at Humboldt High School. Over the course of these three days, students continued developing their college essays and resumes, building on the work they began in the Post-Secondary Exploration course this summer.

During Bridge Day I, students met the UB full-time staff member who will support them as their team leader throughout their senior year. We kicked off the college application process by reviewing key admissions information through a competitive Kahoot activity. Students also received an introduction to the "Bridge Grid," a spreadsheet designed to help them track college applications and senior-year tasks. The rest of the day was dedicated to drafting and refining their college essays and resumes.

Bridge Days II and III continued this momentum. Students learned how to use Xello to request teacher recommendations and official transcripts. They also received information about upcoming virtual FAFSA sessions for students and their parents/guardians. Afterward, they were introduced to the FSA ID process and created their FSA IDs in preparation for the FAFSA appointments in January. Students then met in their Bridge teams to continue finalizing essays, resumes, and college applications.

Overall, all three Bridge Days were productive and successful. Adding a third day proved especially beneficial, providing students and staff with additional work time and more opportunities for individualized support. Many seniors completed polished versions of their essays and resumes and began their college applications through the Common App. The UB team looks forward to supporting Bridge students as they apply to colleges and scholarship opportunities.

# Sophomore Insight Day #1

On Friday, November 7th, the Upward Bound (UB) 10th-grade students participated in their first Sophomore Insight Day of the year. These Sophomore Insight Day events were designed to keep UB sophomores engaged in UB by offering opportunities to explore academics, build community, and participate in team-building or community service activities. This year, the UB sophomores visited the Science Museum of Minnesota, where they explored a variety of STEM-related exhibits and hands-on learning experiences!

In the afternoon, 27 UB sophomores and 5 staff arrived at the museum. Students split into five groups and spent two hours exploring. They visited exhibits such as Dinosaurs & Fossils, the Human Body Gallery, Skin, and more. One of the favorite exhibits was Sportsology, where students got to test and compare their physical abilities through a series of interactive challenges.

After exploring the exhibits, the group attended a show at the Omni Theater and watched *Wild Rescue*. The film highlights the work of the

Santa Barbara Wildlife Care Network, an organization in California that rescues and rehabilitates injured wildlife. Students enjoyed seeing the impact of this work and learned about different ways people can help support wildlife conservation.

The UB sophomores had an amazing time at the Science Museum of Minnesota! We hope they walked away with new knowledge and excitement for STEM. We're already looking forward to their second Sophomore Insight Day on February 16th!

# SLC Fall Retreat Recap

The 2025-2026 Student Leadership Council kicked off the school year with its first event of the fall. This year, SLC members attended the Student Leadership Conference at the Mall of America, where they participated in the TRIO Opportunity Walk and College/Graduate School fair. The conference brought together more than 500 TRIO students across the country for a weekend focused on leadership development, STEM, college, and career preparation.

SLC members participated in the TRIO Opportunity Walk, a one-mile walk around the Mall of America to celebrate and show support for TRIO programs that are changing lives all over the country. Students proudly wore their favorite UB t-shirts, dating back to 2012 and including this summer's design. Hundreds of students, staff, alumni, community members, and TRIO supporters came together for the first annual TRIO Opportunity Walk.

Following the TRIO Opportunity Walk, Jen Rudolph, Associate Vice President of the Council for Opportunity in Education, spoke about the critical work being done to continue supporting TRIO students and programs nationwide. After the speech, SLC members engaged in themed stations and activities, including a photo booth, a TRIO Trivia wheel, and a postcard-writing station as part of an advocacy action highlighting TRIO's impact on students.



Students also had the opportunity to speak with representatives from top colleges and graduate programs at the College/Graduate School fair. More than 50 institutions were represented, many of which offer TRIO programs, such as Student Support Services (SSS) and McNair, to help further UB students' education. It was an amazing opportunity for senior, junior, and sophomore SLC members to explore their postsecondary options.



# ACT Practice Test

On Friday, October 2, 2025, 33 juniors arrived at Central High School in the morning to take a full-length practice ACT. Students grabbed breakfast and then settled in to begin their exam. The UB advisors took turns proctoring different sections to closely simulate what their official ACT testing experience will be like.



Throughout the day, students worked through each section of the ACT. After completing the English, Math, and Reading sections, they enjoyed pizzas, beverages, and snacks before returning to finish the Science section and wrap up with the Writing portion. This structure allowed students to practice pacing, experience real testing conditions, and take meaningful breaks to reset between sections. UB staff guided students through instructions, kept the environment calm and focused, and helped create an experience that mirrored a true ACT environment.

After completing the exam, students wrapped up their day by filling out evaluations. In a week, they will receive a detailed score report that includes an overall performance summary and feedback for each section. UB will be offering a 1-hour ACT practice session during UB tutoring beginning in January and continuing through March.

During this time, students will review their score reports, learn to interpret their results, and identify strategies to improve their scores. These practice sessions will help students prepare for the real test in March.

We had a productive and successful day for our juniors! Students gained firsthand experience with the ACT and will soon receive comprehensive score reports to help them map out an improvement plan. UB staff will continue to follow up with students and assign practice exercises and practice tests to ensure each student has the tools they need to strengthen their skills and boost their scores.
